

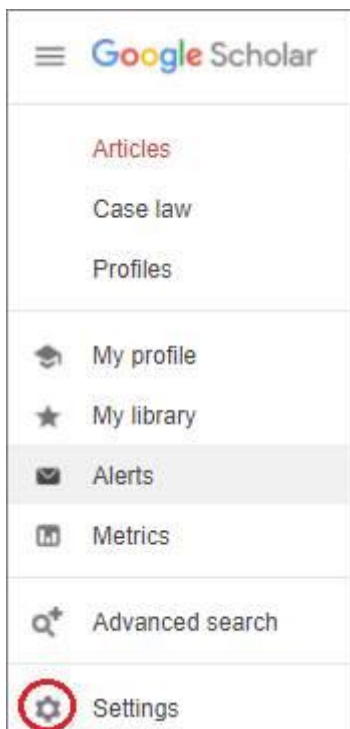
Google Scholar and UCL / Institutional access

You can link Google Scholar to your institutional / UCL account, and thus avail yourself of associated library resources via your Google Scholar searches. This will avoid the usual limits imposed on Google Scholar results.


1. Click the “burger” *menu* in the top-left.



2. Select the *Settings* icon (the “cog” at the bottom of the list).




3. Select **Library links** from the subheadings down the left-hand side. Type *UCL* into the search box and press the **Search** icon (magnifying glass).


